Maria Caldwell was baptized a member of the LDS Church on January 2, 1837 in Lanark, Canada when she was thirteen years old. When she was seventeen, she married William McIntosh in Toronto, York, Canada. Maria and her husband left Canada on foot with their possessions in bundles under their arms to gather with the saints. They suffered much sickness and poverty. They went by canal from Toledo, Ohio to Cincinnati. From there they went to St. Louis where they remained for two years. They went to Council Bluffs on the steamer, Monroe and Light Foot. Many people fell victim to Cholera. Maria and William were shoved from the boat at Savanna, a few miles from St. Joseph, Missouri where they stayed for another two years. William obtained work to earn the provisions they would need for their trek across the plains. They started with John Freeman on May 1, 1851 through rain and mud until they reached Council Bluffs. They joined a group with Brother Smith as the Captain of 100 and Brother David Lewis appointed as captain of their ten. They arrived in the Great Salt Lake Valley in September of 1851.

They moved to Sessions Settlement (Bountiful) to live with her father-in-law, John McIntosh. Then they bought a farm in West Jordan. Due to lack of water and lost crops, they moved to Rush Valley, Utah. Maria cared for her own children, her widowed mother, and her dead sister, Jane Leonard's, two children. She also served in her church. Their family was called to the Dixie Mission in Panaca, Utah. When the Nevada state line was drawn, it included Panaca in the state of Nevada, so they were released from their mission. They lived in Panguitch and then moved to Tooele. In 1892, she and her husband moved to Mt. Pleasant to live near their son, Abraham. In her later years, her health declined and she preceded her husband in death.

to gather with the saints. "Took our journey of many 1000s of miles withaï the courage we could muster.... Suffered much sickness and poverty.... Went by canal from Toledo Ohio to Cincinnati and from there to St. Louis.... Remained there two years.... Started for Council Bluffs on the steamer Monroe and Light Foot.... Many fell victim to cholera, that cruel monster that had no mercy.... We were shoved off the boat at Savanna, a few miles from St. Joseph Mo. ...Stayed there two years."

William prospered after miraculously gaining an understanding of wagon building although having no background in it. He obtained two yokes of steers and two cows and made themselves a good wagon which completed a very good outfit. They started in company with brother John Freeman on 1 May 1851.... Travelled through rain and mud to Council Bluffs ... There the people were organized into companys of 50. and started again about the 15 of May. Brother Smith was our Captain of 100. Brother David Lewis was appointed captain of our ten. We came into the valley 9 Sep 1851.

Maria Caldwell was baptized 2 Jan 1837 in Lanark, Canada. She married at 17 and walked with her husband to Toledo, Ohio. They decided to move west with the Saints 5 May 1849. They sailed as far as Jefferson City, Missouri. Cholera was taking the lives of those around them and they were forced to stay and build wagons and gather new provisions. On 1 May 1851 they started for the GSLV with their two surviving sons in the John Freeman Co. They lived in Sessions, Utah with her Father-in-law John McIntosh. They bought a farm in West Jordan. Due to lack of water and lost crops, they moved to Rush Valley, Utah. They received their endowments in the Council House in S.L.C. 21 Oct 1861. Maria cared for her own children, her widowed mother, and her dead sister Jane Leonard's two children. She also served in her church. The church called their family on a "Dixie Mission" in Panaca, Utah. When the Nevada state line was drawn it included Panaca in Nevada so they were released from their mission. They lived in Panquitch and then moved back to Toole, Utah. Maria suffered for eight years with a throat problem. They decided to travel to S.L. to find help. Jogging along in the wagon, she started coughing and coughed up a large piece of bone that had been lodged in her throat. In 1892 she and her husband moved to Mt. Pleasant to live near their son Abraham. In her later years her health declined and she preceded her husband in death.
